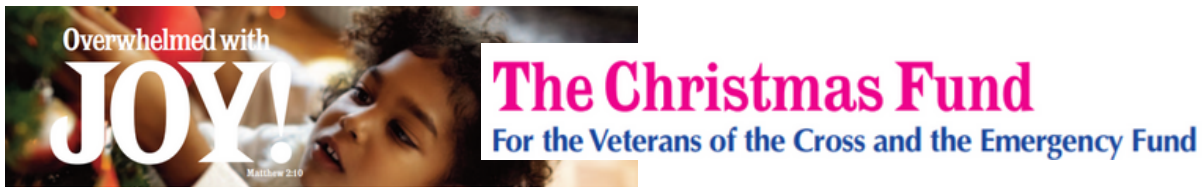


# THE CHRISTMAS FUND OFFERING

As part of the Indigenous Peoples' recognition activities last month, Friends for Justice donated a book to the children's book cart located in the upper narthex. "We Are Water Protectors" by Carole Lindstrom is a Caldecott Medal winning book, beautifully illustrated by Michaela Goade. The author is tribally enrolled with the Turtle Mountain Band of Ojibwe and describes herself as "a fierce water protector". In the story, the child narrator shares the lessons she's learned from her grandmother about the sacred nature of water. We hope you take the time to read this story and enjoy the beautiful illustrations.
