

 - We need further education ourselves before taking a "next step"

 - Beyond self-education, what is the next step for *Friends for Justice*? Is there a next step?


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TERMINOLOGY

What / Who did Columbus "discover"?

Oct 12, 1492:
Columbus landed on a Caribbean island, in current-day
Bahamas.
Indigenous Lucayan or Taino People called it
"Guanahani";
possibly current "San Salvador".

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The Christian Doctrine of Discovery: Vatican Papal Bulls

1096 - 1300 Crusades: non-Christians = enemies of Catholic faith

1452 – Pope Nicholas V (bull: *Romanus Pontifex*): directed King Alfonso of Portugal to "capture, vanquish, and subdue the Saracens, pagans, and other enemies of Christ," to "put them into perpetual slavery," and "to take all their possessions and property."

May, 1493 – Pope Alexander VI (bull: *Inter Cetera*): "granting" to Spain - at the request of Ferdinand and Isabella - the right to conquer the lands which Columbus had already found, as well as any lands which Spain might "discover" in the future.

the "discovered" people should be "subjugated and brought to the faith itself." By this means, said the pope, the "Christian Empire" would be propagated.


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The Christian Doctrine of Discovery: Vatican Papal Bulls

June 1494 – Pope Alexander VI. Treaty of Tordesillas In response to Portugal's protest over bull favoring Spain. Created the line of demarcation: Spain & Portugal. (maps next slides)

1823 – *Johnson vs McIntosh*. SCOTUS rules that federal government controls land; American Indians have only "right of occupancy" but hold no title to the land. Decision cites the Discovery Doctrine.

May 28, 1830 – Indian Removal Act. "Granted" land west of Mississippi to Indian tribes in exchange for tribal lands to the east. (Passed: Senate 28-19; House 101-97; signed by President Andrew Jackson).

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DISMANTLING (REPUDIATING) THE DOCTRINE OF DISCOVERY

- 1992 500-year anniversary of Columbus' arrival in current-day Americas
- Repudiation of Doctrine of Discovery:
 - 2007 > Episcopal Church; Religious Society of Friends; Canadian Anglican Church; Unitarian Universalist Churches
 - February 2012 World Council of Churches denounced the D of D
 - July, 2013 United Church of Christ (General Synod 29)
 - April, 2019 Wisconsin UCC
 - March 2023 Vatican / Pope Francis

Land in Worldview of Indigenous Peoples

"You see, I am alive.

Land in Worldview of U.S. Colonial Settlers

Land is a commodity, an object of trade and utility. Supported by papal Doctrine of Discovery & 1823 US Supreme Court decision

"Everything in US history is about the land — who oversaw and cultivated it, fished its waters, maintained its wildlife; who invaded and stole it; how it became a commodity ("real estate") broken into pieces to be bought and sold on the market"

Most of Algonkian language family: Menominee, Ojibwe (Chippewa), and Potawatomi

Stockbridge-Munsee & Brothertown: also Algonkian-speaking, but relocated from eastern coast to Great Lakes in 19th century

Oneida: Iroquois language group

Ho-Chunk (Winnebago); Siouan language

Tribal Lands circa 1800 in current day Wisconsin:

Ojibwe (Chippewa)

Dakota (Sioux)

Ho-Chunk (Winnebago)



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DISPLACEMENT OF EAST COAST INDIANS to WISCONSIN – early 1800's

Oneida:

- Iroquoian-speaking tribe,
- Pre-colonial Oneida homeland in upstate New York (Oneida Creek & Oneida lake area of north central NY State).
- The Seneca, Cayuga, Onondaga, Oneida, Mohawk, and Tuscarora make up the Six Nations League of the Iroquois.

Stockbridge – Munsee:

- Algonkian-speaking
- Pre-colonial homelands in parts of Massachusetts, NY, Pennsylvania, Connecticut

• Brothertown:

- Eastern Algonquian language (Mohegan, Pequot)
- Pre-colonial homelands in parts of Connecticut, Rhode Island, Long Island
